

### Story: The Very Hungry Caterpillar

#### Day 1

<b>Phonics</b>	Sound of the day 'ur' <b>Read:</b> fur, burn, hurt <b>Segment and spell independently in journals:</b> curl, surf, turn Create a picture for each word.
<b>Reading</b>	Read one of your phonics books. <b>Task:</b> Draw, paint or make your favourite character. Can you label your design?
<b>Writing</b>	Read 'The Hungry Caterpillar' (or watch on You Tube) <a href="https://youtu.be/75NQK-Sm1YY">https://youtu.be/75NQK-Sm1YY</a> In your journal can you draw and label 5 things the caterpillar ate? Can you use adjectives?
<b>Maths</b>	White Rose Maths <a href="https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/">https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/</a> <b>Summer Term - Week 3 - Day 1</b> <b>Additional task:</b> Go on a 3D shape hunt in your house. What shapes can you find? Record these in your journal. <b>Extra challenge:</b> Can you write the shape names too?
<b>Science</b>	<b>Task:</b> Go on a mini beast hunt. <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• What mini beast did you find?</li><li>• Where do they live?</li><li>• Can you draw and label the mini beasts you found?</li></ul>

## Day 2

<b>Phonics</b>	Sound of the day 'ow' <b>Read:</b> down, owl, town <b>Segment and spell independently in journals:</b> cow, gown, clown Create a picture for each word.
<b>Reading</b>	Read one of your phonics books. <b>Task:</b> Discuss what happens in the story with a grown-up. Can you explain the events?
<b>Writing</b>	Can you keep a diary for what you do each day for a week? This could be a picture with simple words, captions or sentences. Remember to include some tricky words too.
<b>Maths</b>	White Rose Maths <a href="https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/">https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/</a> <b>Summer Term - Week 3 - Day 2</b> <b>Additional task:</b> Play snakes and ladders with your grown up. Can you count on when you move your counter? For example, if your counter is on 2 and you roll a 3 you would say 3, 4, 5.
<b>PSHE</b>	Can you design another character for the story that the caterpillar could share the food with? What else might they do together?

## Day 3

<b>Phonics</b>	Sound of the day 'oi' <b>Read:</b> oil, join, boil <b>Segment and spell independently in journals:</b> coin, soil, foil Create a picture for each word.
<b>Reading</b>	Read your tricky words together with a grown-up. Don't forget you can always sing the 'Tricky Words Songs' on YouTube!

<b>Writing</b>	<p>Practise letter formation of the following long ladder letters</p> <p style="text-align: center;">l, i, u, t, y</p> <p>(Formation support sheets in back of journal).</p>
<b>Maths</b>	<p>White Rose Maths <a href="https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/">https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/</a></p> <p><b>Summer Term - Week 3 - Day 3</b></p> <p><b>Additional task:</b> Go on an object hunt around your house and collect between 4 and 6 objects. Can you order these from tallest to shortest? From lightest to heaviest?</p>
<b>Geography</b>	<p>Can you design a map of your home? Don't forget to add some labels.</p>

## Day 4

<b>Phonics</b>	<p>Sound of the day 'ear'</p> <p><b>Read:</b> dear, fear, near</p> <p><b>Segment and spell independently in journals:</b> beard, tear, ear</p> <p>Create a picture for each word.</p>
<b>Reading</b>	<p>Share a book of your choice with a grown-up.</p> <p><b>Task:</b> Can you pretend to be one of the characters? Create a thought bubble for your character.</p>
<b>Writing</b>	<p>Can you sequence the Hungry Caterpillar using the attached sequencing sheet? Can you write a sentence or caption for each picture including key detail and some tricky words too?</p>
<b>Maths</b>	<p>White Rose Maths <a href="https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/">https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/</a></p> <p><b>Summer Term - Week 3 - Day 4</b></p> <p><b>Additional task:</b> Number bonds to 10 – Collect 10 objects then split them up to find all the number bonds to 10 for example 4+6, 2+8. Can you write them all in your journal?</p>

	<b>Challenge:</b> Ask an adult to say a number from 0 to 10. Can you tell your adult what number you have to add to it for them to equal 10?
<b>Art</b>	Create your own caterpillar or butterfly. You could use playdough, paint, rocks, Lego, paper plates. Be creative!

## Day 5

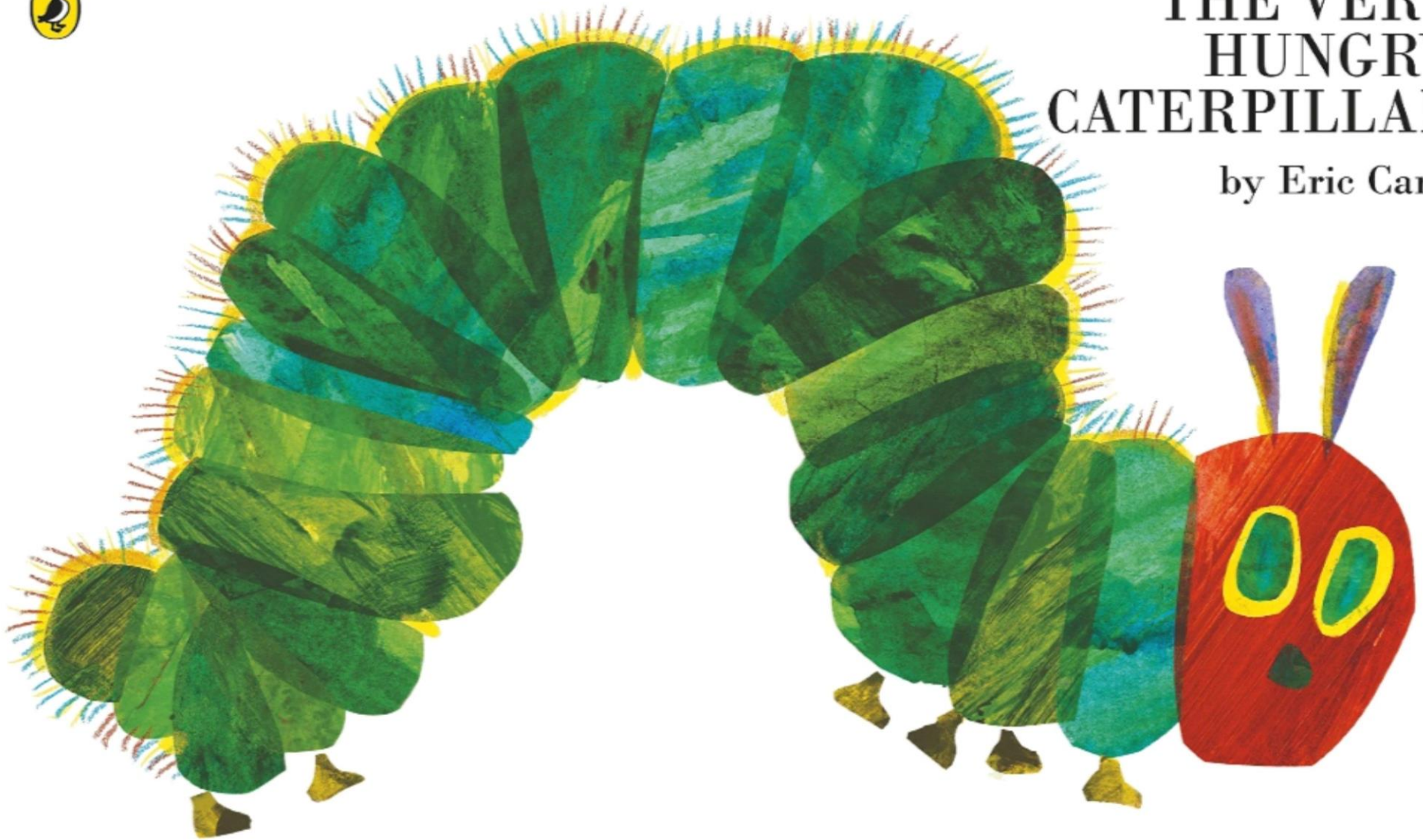
<b>Phonics</b>	Sound of the day 'air' <b>Read:</b> hair, air, chair <b>Segment and spell independently in journals:</b> chair, fair, pair Create a picture for each word.
<b>Reading</b>	Read one of your phonics books. <b>Task:</b> Can you find any words with this week's sounds in? You could even write them in your journal.
<b>Writing</b>	Draw and label a picture of the caterpillar. Can you write some sentences about the caterpillar? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• He has</li> <li>• He is</li> </ul> Use your phonics mats in the back of your journal to help with spelling
<b>Maths</b>	White Rose Maths <a href="https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/">https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/early-years/</a> <b>Summer Term - Week 3 - Day 5</b> <b>Additional task:</b> Can you make a number 10 poster? Showing everything, you know about 10.




# THE VERY HUNGRY CATERPILLAR

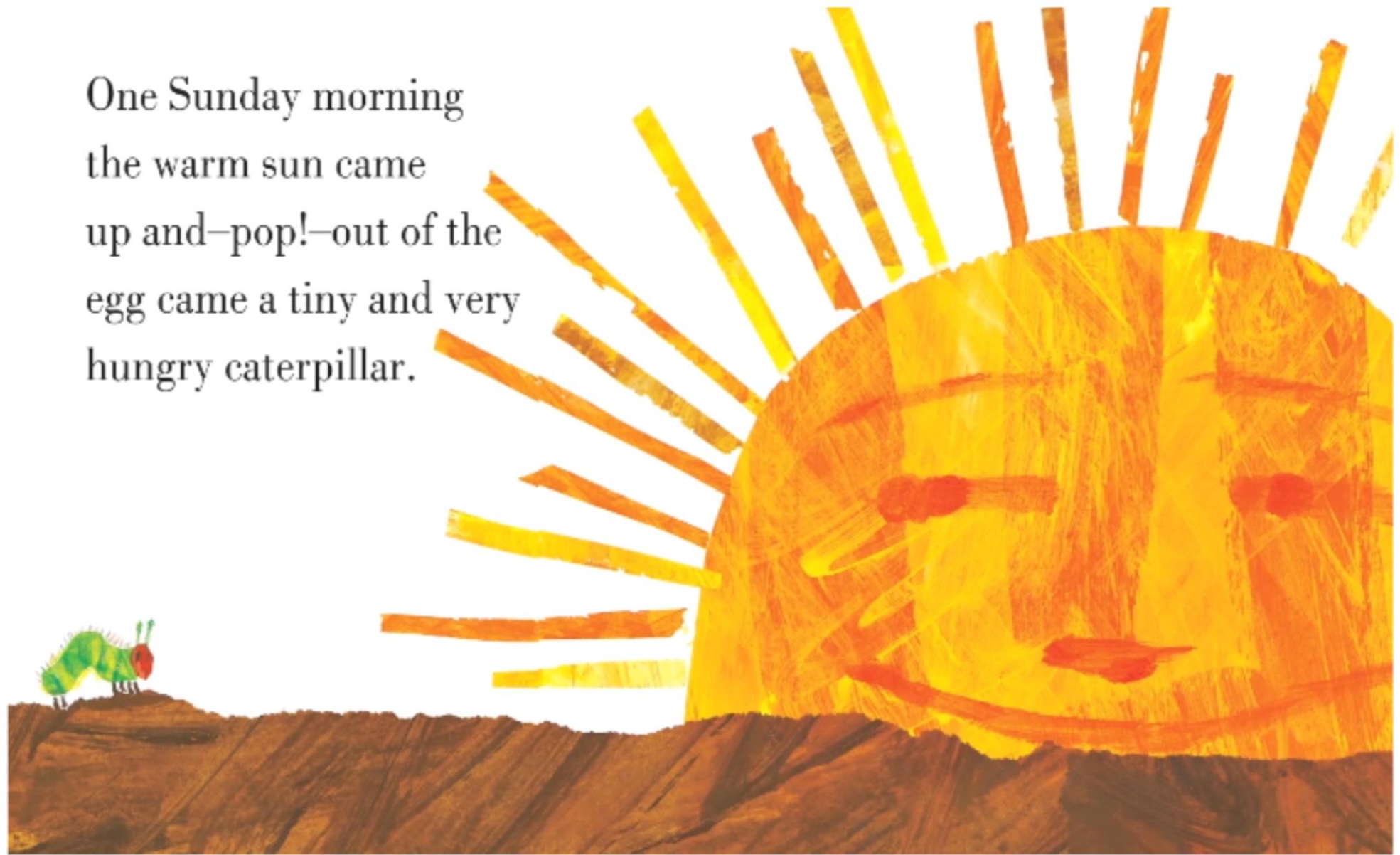






In the light of the moon
