Day 1

Writing	<p>Look at the picture again: May 3rd - Professor Plum</p> <p>Task: Sentences are much more exciting if they contain description and detail. Improve these sentences to make them more interesting and exciting to the reader.</p> <p><i>He flicked the flask. It had a red liquid inside. It bubbled. The room was smoky.</i></p> <p>Think about including adjectives, adverbs, figurative language and different sentence openers.</p>

Geography	<p>Imagine you could design your own route for a bike race similar to the Tour-de-Yorkshire. Draw a picture of your route. What would the cyclists see as they cycle around it? Think about geography features such as coast, forests, mountains, hills, streams etc. Label the features you have included.</p> <p>Think about how you would make the route challenging for cyclists. A flat route would not be much of a challenge but adding a few hills might make it more difficult!</p> <p>The route you design does not have to be between two real places in Yorkshire. It can be from your imagination. However, there are some maps of Yorkshire below if you want to use them to help you.</p>

Day 4

Phonics	Word search (see template below) Task: Make your own word search using 'mis' words, the 3/4 words or a mixture of both. You could ask a family member to do it once you have finished.
Reading	The article 'Rosie the Penguin turns 30' mentions that penguins are classed as vulnerable to extinction in the wild. Task: Answer the question: <i>Whose job do you think it is to protect animals in the wild?</i> Explain your reasoning. Why do you think this?
Writing	Look at the picture again: May 3 rd - Professor Plum Task: Story starter! Can you continue the story after the starter? Think about: * What happened when the potion was ready? * What type of potion was it? * Who is Professor Plum and why is he making the potion? Starter Professor Plum had been locked away in his laboratory for days now, barely even stopping to eat or drink. He rested his left arm on the dusty pile of books scattered across his desk, and with his right hand he gently flicked the conical flask in front of him. The red and orange liquid inside coughed and spluttered as heat from the Bunsen burner excited it from below. Professor Plum wiped his weary eyes; only the excitement of finally finishing the potion kept him awake. Just a few more hours, then it would be ready...



DT	Design an animal puppet from one of the categories we have been looking at in Science over the last few weeks: mammals, reptiles, birds, amphibians, fish, vertebrate, invertebrate. Most powerful supernova in the universe

A mammoth star explosion known as SN2016aps, which occurred about 4.5 million light-years away from Earth, is the brightest supernova ever seen, an international team of astronomers have reported in a new study. The brilliant new supernova shatters cosmic records for brightness, energy, and also mass. It was between 50 to 100 solar masses, which is much greater than the 8 to 15 solar mass explosions typically seen. It was 500 times brighter than a typical supernova and much more energetic, releasing about 10 times more energy than the sun will emit in its entire lifetime! Dr Matt Nicholl, lead author of the study and lecturer at the University of Birmingham School of Physics and Astronomy, said "We found the radiation was five times the explosion energy of a normal-sized supernova. This is the most light we have ever seen emitted by a supernova!"

Passenger accidentally ejects himself from jet

A 64-year-old man was given a surprise gift of flight in a Dassault Rafale (meaning burst of fire), a French twin-engine, canard delta wing, multirole fighter aircraft, by his colleagues to celebrate his retirement. Just after the jet had taken off at Saint-Dizier 113 air base, the passenger was ejected from the back of the plane. An investigation into the incident which has just been released by France's Bureau of Enquiry and Analysis for Civil Aviation Safety, has confirmed that he was so startled when the plane took off that he accidentally grabbed the handle that releases the Martin-Baker MK16 ejection seat to steady himself! This caused him to self-eject with his seat, being thrown from the aircraft, he then parachuted down to the ground and landed safely in a field. The pilot performed back-up actions and was then able to land the plane.

Rosie the penguin turns 30!





Rosie, the Humboldt penguin, is one of the UKs oldest penguins and has just celebrated turning 30! Even though Sewerby Hall and Gardens, where she and her penguin pals, Dion, Pingu and Penny live, is currently closed, Rosie celebrated in style behind the scenes on the 20th of April. This is a big achievement as Humboldt penguins have a life expectancy of between 15 and 20 years in the wild. The penguins are classed as vulnerable to extinction due to changes in climate and overfishing of their preferred prey. Rosie, who was bred in captivity, came to live at the hall in 1990 and has successfully hatched chicks, playing a vital role in the zoo's breeding programme. "We are genuinely excited that Rosie is about to reach her 30th birthday," said John Pickering, head zookeeper, before the big day.





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TOUR DE YORKSHIRE 2020

› Sustainability

The issue of sustainability and the future of our planet is really important and never far from the news. We know that cycling is a sustainable form of transport and a healthy activity, but we also recognise that cycling races can use lots of additional resources that can have a negative impact on the environment.

The teams who organise large outdoor events such as the Tour de Yorkshire are working hard to reduce the possible negative impacts on the environment. Here are some of the steps being taken to promote sustainable events:

RESOURCES

Event organisers are encouraged to buy resources locally. Resources that can be used again should be stored and used for future years or made available for a different event. Where possible branding will be non-date specific so that it can be used again the following year. An overall reduction in raw material is encouraged.

TRAVEL AND TRANSPORT

Events are encouraged to use fewer vehicles. The use of public transport, including buses, tams and trains is encouraged. Where cars are necessary it is important to fill as many seats in the car as possible and electric vehicles will be used if available.

WASTE MANAGEMENT

An effective waste management strategy will ensure that as few items as possible end up in landfill. Spectator areas will have recycling facilities for the disposal of waste. As many items as possible will be reused, rehomed or recycled.

CARBON REDUCTION

Event organisers are encouraged to measure the carbon footprint of their event and develop a strategy to reduce it the following year. Strategies to offset carbon emissions should be developed.


