What Is Plastic Pollution?

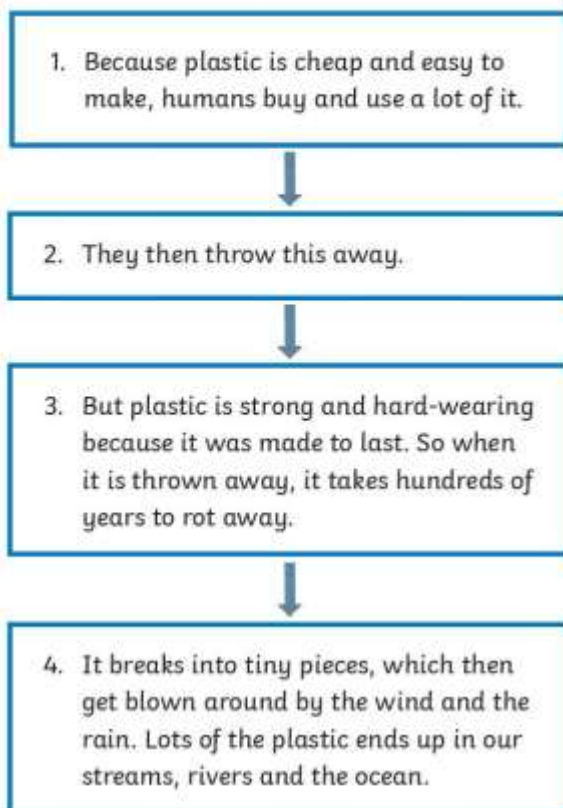
The biggest problem with unwanted plastic is the damage it causes to the environment.

- 80% of the rubbish floating in the oceans is plastic.
- Plastic bags are killing over 100,000 marine animals and birds every year.

End Plastic Pollution



The amount of plastic on the planet is increasing more and more rapidly, meaning it is threatening our planet through:

- poisoning and injuring sea life;
- littering beaches and landscapes;
- clogging landfills (or rubbish dumps);
- making humans (and other animals) ill.



What Can You Do to 'End Plastic Pollution'?

The Three Rs: First Reduce, Then Reuse, Then Recycle

There are lots of things we can all do to help end plastic pollution.

- **Reduce:** Avoid single-use plastics, such as straws and takeaway cups. Choose alternatives, such as bamboo. Talk to your family, head teacher or school council about how your school and family can reduce their plastic use.
- **Reuse:** Instead of buying new ones, refill and reuse water bottles and lunch bags. Use fabric bags, which are strong and long-lasting, for carrying shopping rather than single-use plastic bags.
- **Recycle:** Check for the recycling symbol before you buy plastic. Then make sure that you always recycle plastic when you can, instead of throwing it away with the normal litter.

Amazing Fact

An ostrich's brain is smaller than its eyeballs.

skin

The most important organ in our body. It is here where we think, feel emotions, make decisions and control the rest of the body. This organ is protected by a thick skull and fluid.

kidneys

Major organs that bring much needed oxygen into our blood stream.

stomach

Performs all sorts of vital functions in our bodies from helping us to break down food in digestion to ridding our bodies of toxins.

heart

Holds our food when we first eat it and secretes enzymes that help to break down our food before it goes to the small intestine.

liver

Help to keep our bodies clean from toxins and other waste products. Without these, our blood would quickly become poisoned.

brain

Considered by many to be the centre of life. This organ helps to keep the rest of the organs and body healthy as well.

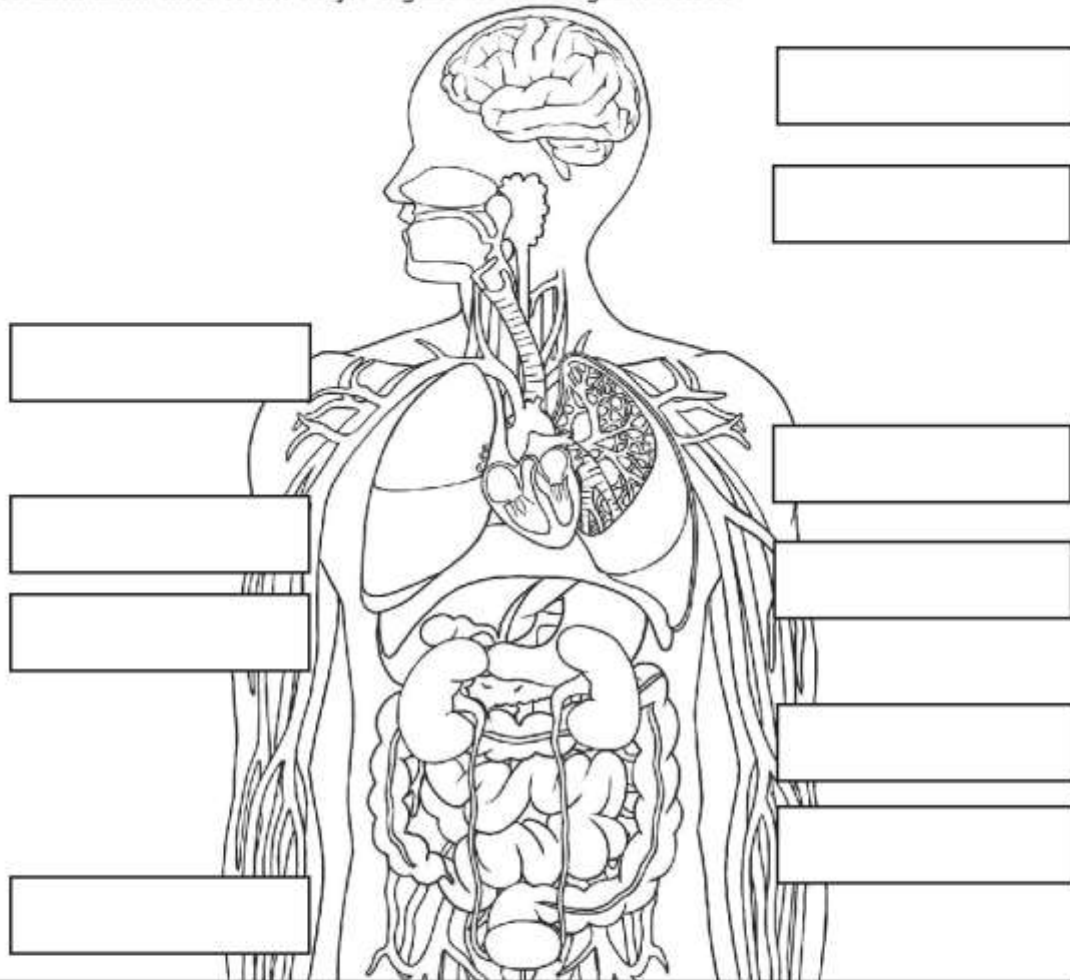
lungs

- which animals are thought to be most intelligent.

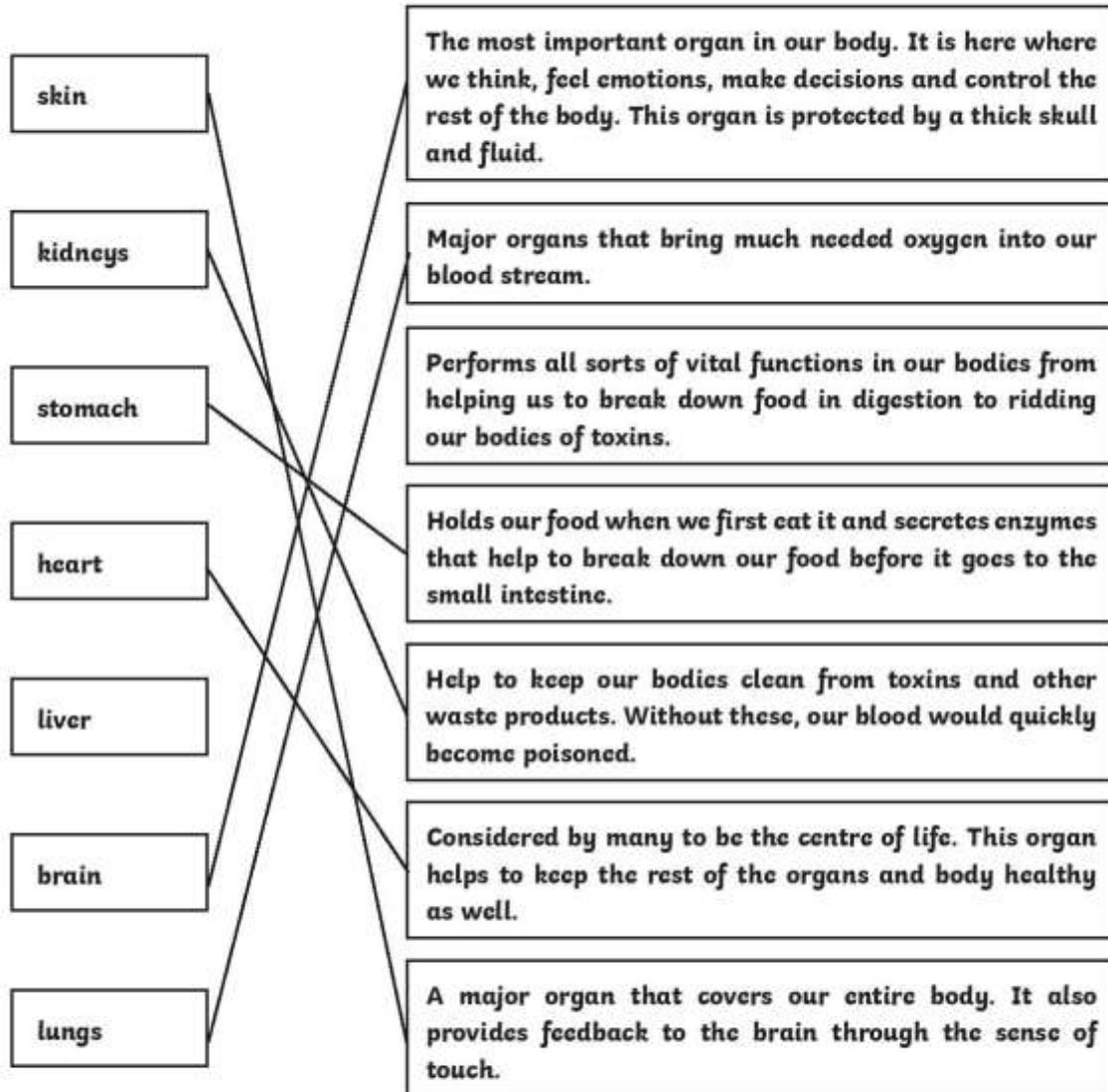

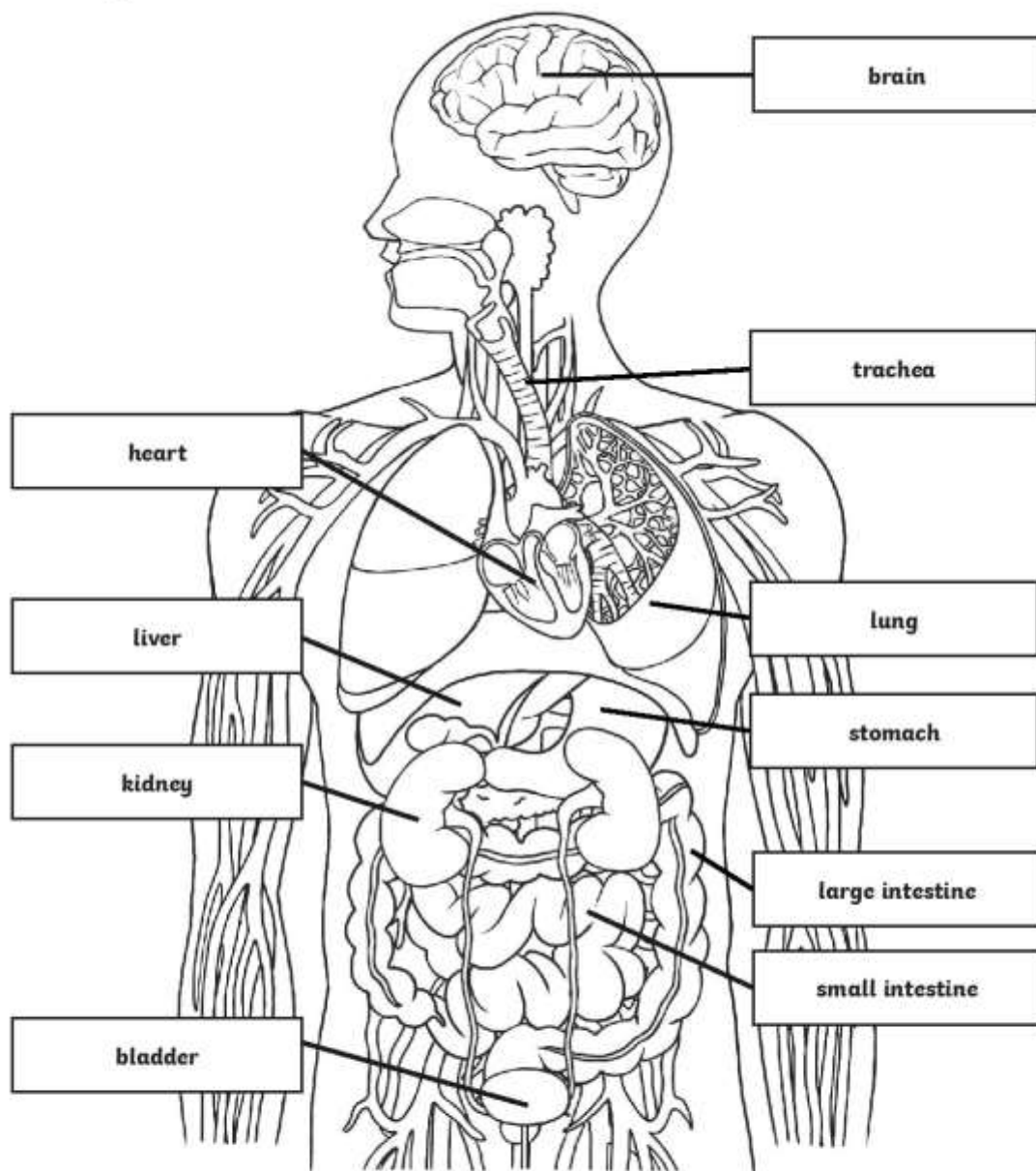

This bracing moorland village has attracted visitors since the 19th century, but numbers soared following its appearance (as 'Aidensfield') in the television series 'Heartbeat' and its role in the 'Harry Potter' films. It's fun to arrive on the trains of the North Yorkshire Moors Railway, after which walkers can enjoy lots of local strolls and hikes.

Things to see and do

The North Yorkshire Moors Railway has a heritage station in Goathland, which may be familiar as 'Hogsmeade' station from the early Harry Potter films.

Wade's Causeway, also known as the 'Roman road', runs across nearby Wheeldale Moor. Long considered Roman in date, this is now less certain – it may date from early medieval times or may even have been built by a certain Wade the Giant . . .

Walks

The 'Rail Trail' from Goathland to Grosmont combines a signposted three-and-a-half mile walk down the old railway line with a ride back up on the North Yorkshire Moors Railway. There's a guidebook available in local shops.

The 70ft (21m) high Mallyan Spout waterfall can be reached by a footpath close to the Mallyan Spout Hotel. Download the route here, or buy the booklet 'Walks around Goathland', available from local shops, which includes the waterfall route and four other local walks.

Follow the Centenary Walk to reflect upon the effect that wars and conflict have had on a small settlement such as Goathland. This 2 mile gentle walk starts on the disused railway line (next to Goathland Hotel), crosses fields to the church and then returns to the village centre by road passing the war memorial. An information panel is located at the start of the walk detailing the route.

Eating and drinking

There are several cafés and a pub in Goathland, and a public bar and restaurant at the Mallyan Spout Hotel. Walk down Rail Trail to the hamlet of Beck Hole and you can visit the riverside Birch Hall Inn. North Yorkshire's smallest and quaintest pub? You decide.
